

MASK POLICY



Workplace masking policy for health-care providers, patients and visitors

This document outlines Island Health and provincial expectations for the use of face masks in the workplace at Island Health. Masking, combined with the COVID-19 vaccine and the safety precautions of physical distancing, excellent hand hygiene, and staying home when unwell, will help keep health-care workers and our patients, clients, residents and families safe from COVID-19. NOTES:

- Failure to comply with the policy may result in corrective action, up to and including termination (excepting legitimate reasons why an employee is unable to follow this direction).
- N95 respirators are to be reserved for AGMPs and where N95s are part of the PPE required for airborne and or specific precautions.

Health-care facility or care environment (excluding Long Term Care and Assisted Living)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> When entering and moving around and visiting a loved one in any health care facility, including clinical and non-clinical areas For the duration of their visit (indoor and outdoor) and adhere to any preventative measures required to support visits 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Medical-grade masks 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All visitors
Long-Term Care & Assisted Living facilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> When entering and moving around and visiting a loved one in any health care facility, including clinical and non-clinical areas For the duration of their visit (indoor and outdoor) and adhere to any preventative measures required to support visits 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Medical-grade masks 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Fully vaccinated visitors*

* Vaccinated is defined as having had 2 doses of COVID-19 Vaccine plus a duration of 7 days following second dose.

Environment	Environment Example	Type of Mask	Used by
Healthcare facility or care environment Excluding Long-Term Care and Assisted Living settings	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • During transport within a healthcare facility • When moving around a healthcare facility • While in a waiting area (ED or any department) • While in any bed space that is only separated by a curtain in the ED • Actively coughing in a multi-bed room on droplet or contact/droplet precautions <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ single room should be prioritised where possible, see bed placement for patients on additional precautions 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medical-grade mask 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Patients

Exemptions for Visitors and Patients:

- Exceptions to the policy must be applied for:
 - people under 5 years old,
 - people unable to wear a mask because of a health condition or physical or mental impairment,
 - people unable to put on or remove a mask without help from another person, and
 - people communicating with someone with a hearing impairment.
- People who are required to wear a mask and are able to wear a mask, but who choose not to as a matter of preference, are not exempt.
