



June 16, 2021 – British Columbia (BC) Enters Step 2 of Restart Plan

BC is now in Step 2 of the Restart Plan and British Columbians can once again travel recreationally throughout the province. Island Health Chief Medical Health Officer Dr. Richard Stanwick said yesterday that "travel from the mainland to Vancouver Island is resuming as case counts throughout B.C. have been dropping." British Columbians can gather with up to 50 people outdoors; attend organized indoor gatherings (for example, banquets and theatre events) of up to 50 people with safety plans in place; return to faith gatherings; participate in an indoor fitness class or team sport; and order alcohol until midnight. Masks and physical distancing are still mandatory in all public settings.

According to the latest Doctors of BC In Circulation Update, and based on the Premier's recent announcements, primary care providers can expect to see the following during Step 2:



- Doctor waiting rooms current rules remain in place, including mandatory mask wearing. Doctors' offices should
 have a maximum of five people in the waiting room (depending on the size of the waiting area), they must be
 distanced (unless members of the same household), and everyone must be wearing a medical mask.
- Travel With non-essential travel restrictions within BC lifted, travel to/from meetings can resume. Small, in-person meetings are allowed, however everyone must be masked if social distancing cannot be attained.

In addition, discussions are taking place between public health staff at the Ministry of Health and the BCCDC to determine which restrictions will stay in place and for how long, and next steps regarding updating <u>guidelines for infection prevention and control measures</u> for physician offices. While lifting the mask mandate is anticipated as the province enters Step 3 (tentatively July 1) there is discussion underway as to whether the wearing of masks in phsyician offices and medical facilities should be extended, particularly as we head into the respiratory season in the fall.
