Role within the organization:

Additionally, I find fulfillment in my role as the Developmental Pediatrics Rotation Lead for pediatric residents, contributing to their education and growth.

Proudest accomplishment to date:

I take immense pride in spearheading the establishment of the Cerebral Palsy (CP) early diagnosis clinic and a pioneering provincial early motor screening program, the first of its kind in Canada.

Collaborating with a multidisciplinary team, we are committed to lowering the age of diagnosis, enhancing communication around CP, and ultimately improving outcomes across various domains, guided by the F-words in disability: Functioning, Family, Fitness, Fun, Friends, and Future.

Inspiration to become a doctor and pursue research:

My calling to become a doctor was deeply rooted in me since childhood, guiding me toward a dedicated path in pediatrics. The fascination of unraveling the complexities of the brain and its development, the interplay of genetics and environment, and supporting positive development led me to the field of Developmental Pediatrics. Witnessing the brain's adaptability and our capacity to support it, even after injury, fuels my passion for this specialty.

These guidelines have been disseminated throughout the province and it is the basis of guidelines that have been created by other regional and rural hospitals. This has meant that children and adolescents who would have otherwise been transferred to Vancouver, have been able to stay within their local hospital for medical stabilisation.


Research affiliations and research interests:

As a community pediatrician, I love the variety in my work. I practice acute neonatal and pediatric care, as well as look after children with chronic medical needs and mental health challenges. I also love forming long term relationships with patients and families.

Role within the organization:

I have been working in Fraser Health as a community pediatrician since I moved to South Surrey from Edmonton in 2014. I share

an office in Surrey with three amazing pediatricians where I practice general pediatrics. I provide call coverage at Langley Memorial and Peace Arch Hospitals.

I also volunteer as a pediatrician at the Umbrella Multicultural Health Co-op in New Westminster which provides teambased care to immigrants and newcomers to the lower mainland. I have been the DSSL for undergraduate medical education at Langley Memorial Hospital since 2019.

I have been involved in leadership at the department of pediatrics at Peace Arch Hospital since 2021 where I currently serve as local department head.

Proudest accomplishment to date:

Along with my colleague Dr. Laura Lewington and the incredible team at Fraser Health, I helped establish a pediatric rapid access clinic at Peace Arch Hospital in 2022 which has provided a much-needed service to our community. This clinic, along with a recently negotiated service contract, has allowed us to recruit more locum pediatricians. This has helped to stabilize the pediatric service at our hospital which was in danger of being shut down two years ago.

I'm also proud of the balance I've created between my clinical/ administrative responsibilities and my family life. I think this is one of the most difficult things we must do as physicians.

Inspiration to become a doctor:

I draw a lot of inspiration from my parents; my father was a general surgeon, and my mother was a surgical nurse. I have wanted to be a physician for as long as I can remember despite growing up seeing the ups and downs of life in medicine.

I have always loved hanging out with kids and getting to know people from all walks of life. I derive a lot of fulfilment from day-to-day patient interactions such as successfully advocating for funding for a child with special needs, solving a diagnostic dilemma, or supporting a family as they navigate their child's chronic illness.
