Patient-Oriented Research in BC: Five Years In

The results are in! An evaluation of the first five years of The BC SUPPORT Unit is now available (2016/17 - 21/22). The British Columbia (BC) Support for People and POR and Trials (SUPPORT) Unit's goal is to support, streamline, and increase patient-oriented research (POR) across BC.

<u>The evaluation</u> found that the Unit is making progress toward this goal, aided by its ingrained provincial infrastructure and a diverse array of activities and supports – from training to data platforms and services.

Moving forward, the evaluation recommends that the Unit increase its focus on equity and diversity to engage a broader range of patient populations; increase awareness and visibility; and continue to engage stakeholders in strategic planning.

Whether you provide direct patient care, work in a supportive role, or provide administrative support/leadership, we would like to hear from you and understand your experiences through this pandemic.

Have Your Say – Help Us Improve Island Health's Institutional Review Process This survey is a quality improvement initiative designed to assist us in 1) refining our processes to enhance experience and, 2) sustaining elements that support an optimal experience.

The survey is for those who:

- 1) apply for Institutional review to conduct research at Island Health
- 2) review and approve operational requests to conduct research studies in their departments/programs
- 3) conduct research ethics reviews (i.e. REB members)
- 4) support the administration/coordination of the review processes in the Research Department

If you have more than one of these roles, please complete a separate survey for each role. The survey does not collect names, however we are collecting the general role that you interact with the process in and your department/areas of work, therefore participation is anonymized. This means we do not have any direct link between you and your responses but you may be identified indirectly. This survey is a quality improvement initiative for the internal purposes of the Research Department. As such it did not require formal research ethics review. A high level summary of the results will be provided in a future edition of the Island Health Research Dispatch.
