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BACKGROUND

The Joint Standing Committee on Rural Issues (JSC) has changed the way that rural physicians receive funding for individual rural continuing medical education (RCME): rural physicians now receive direct payment for individual RCME. Without carry-over of individual RCME funds, reverted community funds which have been used for collective RCME experiences will eventually be or already are depleted.

After a provincial process of engagement, the JSC has approved the RCME Community Program. RSA Communities implemented into the program receive funding every year to address community RCME needs.

Each RSA community has a number of steps to complete to implement into the new program. One of the steps and discussions during the implementation process is consideration for a defined role for non-physician admin for community RCME support.

This handbook/resource guide has been developed to provide local, multi-community and/or regional administrative staff with the tools and knowledge to support community RCME as well as have a better understanding of RCME processes and functions. It also provides physician groups with information on closer to home continuing medical education opportunities and additional resources and funding options.

WHAT IS RCME?

The Rural Continuing Medical Education (RCME) Community Program funds groups of physicians living and delivering care in eligible Rural Practice Subsidiary Agreement (RSA) communities to address their collective learning needs, unlike RCME for Individuals which is paid directly to the rural physician to facilitate individual learning needs. The program aims to improve the capacity of local health care systems to address the needs of community members by giving physicians more control over collective learning activities, reducing the challenges of accessing funds, and improving relationships among health system partners.

RCME COMMUNITY PROGRAM PRINCIPLES

Rural CME activities must meet the criteria and principles put forward by the Joint Standing Committee on Rural Issues to be eligible for reimbursement. General principles are as follows:

- Funds are to be used for RSA communities only
- Funds should be applied in alignment with any priorities set out by the JSC and not in a way that may be contradictory with the priorities of the Health Authority or Ministry of Health
- Funds should be applied in a way that is community focused and responsive to the needs of physicians. This
 includes being equitable and accessible across all physicians or groups of physicians (GPs, Specialists, GPs with
 enhanced skills)
- Community funds may be accessed by groups of physicians to incentivize certain types of education including: building and sustaining regional professional care networks closer to home CME community or regional teambased care, etc.
- Funds may be used to deliver activities involving allied health professionals in their community
- Funds may be used to compensate physicians for time spent developing and/or planning CME events. Funds are
 not to be used to pay physicians for time spent participating in CME events
- Unused funds can accumulate up to three (3) years. After three years, unspent funds would continue to remain with the community, and will only be replenished by the program if a plan is produced documenting future spending and goals of the accumulation

INVOICING AND PAYMENTS

Communities are to select and organize a fund holder who will make funds available as needed and consistent with the local criteria as implemented locally, undertake financial reporting requirements and provide prudent, timely and transparent management of the funds. Funds may be managed by the health authority or by an existing incorporated, non-profit organization who will act as the fund holders.

Note: Island Health is the chosen fund holder for all RCME communities for the Vancouver Island/Island Health regions. As such, Island Health will complete all financial processes as outlined in a Memorandum of Understanding with the community and RCCbc, and provide quarterly reporting to the RCME Liaison who will include this information in the bi-annual reporting to the JSC RCME Subcommittee.

The RCME Liaison and Island Health will facilitate the payment process, track all expenditures and provide reporting as requested:

RCME ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

RCME PHYSICIAN LEAD ROLE

Activities

- Promote the utilization of RCME Community funds to all medical staff
- Engage community of physicians in RCME
- Circulates materials to engage physicians in assessing community learning needs. If requested, collates results to make a list of preferred Community RCME topics
- Ensures that RCME activities, events and plans are widely communicated to physicians and inter-professional team where applicable
- Review and approve application requests to utilize RCME Community Funds
- May allocate up to 20% of annual RCME Community Program funds to hire a local non-physician administrative support. If no local support:
 - Plans, coordinates and executes all aspects of educational events in partnership with various groups/individuals

Administration

- Serves as the key contact for anything RCME related such as invoice approvals, education inquires, contact for the physician group
- Works closely with local RCME Support if applicable for community, if no local support:
 - o Connects with regional RCME Liaison regularly to receive updated RCME Community Budget information
 - Submits all completed cheque requests and accompanying invoices and receipts to the regional RCME
 Liaison for tracking and processing
 - o Communicates education requests/planning to the regional RCME Liaison
 - Serves as the key contact for inquires and problem solving related to RCME responds to general inquiries from a variety of internal and external contacts in relation to RCME

RCME LOCAL RCME SUPPORT ROLE

Administration

- Connects with regional RCME Liaison regularly to receive updated RCME Community Budget information
- Communicates education requests/planning to the RCME Liaison
- Submits all Community Program Funds Application approved by RCME Physician Lead to RCME Liaison for program approval in advance of planning
- Submits all cheque requests approved by RCME Physician Lead and accompanying invoices and receipts to the regional RCME Liaison for tracking and processing
- Updates and maintains the local RCME calendar and ensures that RCME activities
- Updates and maintains email distribution lists
- Maintains an inventory of educational resources and continuing medical education information
- Serves as the key contact for inquires and problem solving related to RCME responds to general inquiries from a variety of internal and external contacts in relation to RCME

Examples of Activities

- Circulates materials to engage physicians in assessing community learning needs. If requested, collates results to make a list of preferred Community RCME topics
- Ensures that RCME activities, events and plans are widely communicated to medical staff, other groups/individuals
- Arranges RCME Committee meetings, attends and takes minutes, if required
- Plans, coordinates and executes all aspects of educational events in partnership with other groups/individuals:
 - Supports the application process for accreditation of CME events if requested,
 - Prepares all documentation and creates event packages (agenda, speaker bios, learning objectives, sign in, evaluations) required to support accredited activities
 - Advertisement and promotion,
 - o Organizes venue, catering and other equipment and services needed for successful events
 - Manages calendar bookings as directed by RCME Physician Lead for Community RCME Learning
 - o Ensures resources are in place to support external video/remote connection, if needed
 - Arranges for visiting speakers, assists and coordinates their visits
 - Hosts registration desk and tracks attendance
 - Sets up and take down events
 - Circulates, collects and collates evaluations after activities

Relationships

- Works closely with RCME Physician(s) Lead, regional RCME Liaison and RCME Committee where applicable
- Establishes and maintains strong relationships with physicians to help identify community education needs
- Participates in the Provincial Community of Practice meetings

Accountability/Reporting

The Local RCME Support works closely with and reports to the Physician RCME Lead(s) and regional RCME Liaison.

RCME LIAISON

- Responsible for the regional management of RCME program fund tracking, monitoring and reporting
- Assists rural and remote RSA communities within the Island Region to develop processes, structures and policies to execute community RCME
- Assists with provincial applications for funding including Rural Education Action Plan (REAP) Bursaries and SPIFI
- Serves as a key contact for inquiries and program solving related to RCME
- Support rural communities with the implementation of the program, including help with:
 - designing or describing your local RCME Community Program model, including an annual budget
 - developing agreements with other communities if you want to include several communities
 - o building or adapting policies and processes and anything else you need to have a robust model

(over and above the community's annual allocation)

REAP – Rural Education Action Plan

REAP supports the training needs of physicians in rural practice, provides undergraduate medical students and postgraduate residents with rural practice experience, and increases rural physician participation into the medical school selection process.

Community Form for Use of Rural Continuing Medical Education (RCME) Community Funds

RCME Community Program funding is negotiated through the PMA, and is available to physicians living in and delivering health care services in RSA communities.

Note: The RCME community program and funding provides an opportunity to include interprofessional team members and other community providers in relevant CME activities as determined by the local community of physicians. Eligible expenses

- Accreditation (i.e. application fees)
- Attendee Travel/Accommodation Travel and accommodation expenses to for community group of physicians to attend collective CME outside community, when unable/unavailable to bring CME to community
- Coordination local/multi community CME coordination by local physicians, allied health providers, and/or local RCME coordinator
- Equipment Equipment that enables or enhances community RCME delivery and enables physicians to participate
- Honorarium/Sessionals Curriculum development and delivery (i.e. speaker fees, instructor fees, course preparation)

- Catering Expenses
- Meeting Expenses Textbooks, speaker gifts, supplies for events, etc.
- RCME Physician Lead Community physician lead stipend for planning and organizing CME
- Registration Course Fees Registration, course, workshop, etc. fees in-person or virtual
