



Evaluation Summary

Thank you to those who attended and took the time to share their feedback! We are continuing to learn and grow and are excited to plan future opportunities for collaboration. Feedback from the event was overwhelmingly positive.

We had 98 medical staff and multidisciplinary team members register for the event, and confirmed an attendance of 87 participants.

56 attendees responded to the engagement survey following the event, of which 91% were medical staff. 80% of participants who responded to the survey indicated they would like to be engaged with Choosing Wisely at Island Health going forward through attending future symposiums, involvement in projects, our Community of Practice, smaller virtual events, or through subscription to our Medical Staff Quality newsletter.



"I like the opportunity to gather in a non clinical setting to set my vision a little wider for what can be achieved by our organization as a whole. In day to day clinical practice, it's easy to get quite myopic and just focus on getting through the day. Events like this are very valuable to help take the blinders off and set a vision for what we can co-create by working together."

The focused breakout sessions and the opportunity to connect virtually with colleagues were considered the highlights of the day, and participants left feeling energized and motivated to continue engagement with Choosing Wisely both with Island Health and in their daily practice.

Our participants consider the biggest benefits of participating in Choosing Wisely at Island Health to be:

- Learning about Choosing Wisely at Island Health and the benefits it brings to both the bigger picture and individual practice.
- Feeling heard when giving feedback and hearing what my colleagues were saying; leaving empowered to make a difference and engage on issues knowing there is a dedicated group of people with the enthusiasm and skills to make change happen.
- Gaining more QI knowledge, including meeting 'key players' and finding out what resources are available and who may be interested in future involvement.

We are investigating ways to continue engagement, particularly with our most popular breakout sessions: Abnormal Results Rate, Antipsychotics in Acute Care, and Planetary Health.
